The worldwide upsurge in cultural revitalization movements in diverse indigenous and minority groups in the 1990s vividly confronted us with the reality that every population seeks its originality and uniqueness within the multi-cultural /ethnic landscape of modern nation states against the myth that modernity would push forward cultural uniformity and globalization. Anthropological studies suggest the emergence of a reappraisal of the animistic world view and its shift to a philosophy of symbiosis with nature among indigenous peoples, the making of religious institutions to facilitate the keeping of the feeling of belongingness to their native population, and the (re-)vitalization of local rituals to generate regional solidarity and connectedness. This workshop proposes, being based on a variety of case studies, to explore the similarities and uniqueness in the ways how immigrants, refugees, migrants, or minorities have fought against the dominant culture and the uniformity of globalization to maintain a micro-regional community by remaking connectedness within a group.
